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Dear Friend,

I'll never forget the day my 5-year-old son came home from school, worried. One of the other kids told him I was going to die.

Statistically speaking, my son's friend was right. I'd been diagnosed with metastatic prostate cancer, which had already spread to dozens of my bones.

The prognosis: 17 months to live.

How could this be happening?

At 48, I had always prided myself on staying in good health. I was at the peak of a successful career as a cardiologist and professor. And I had three young children who needed their daddy.

This wasn't the way things were supposed to end.

Yet there I was . . . in a fierce battle with a disease that claims the lives of tens of thousands of men every year.

My family was stunned. Roxanne, my wife, was faced with the reality of raising our children on her own. And our kids were gripped by the fear of losing their father.

I wanted to scream or cry, but I didn't have time. There were important things to be done.

I envisioned writing letters to my children and making a videotape for them to remember me. I was preparing for what seemed like the inevitable.

Just a few years ago, my only option would have been hormonal therapy, which would have been effective for about one year.

But during my treatment, which included multiple rounds of different chemotherapies and intravenous radiation therapy, I learned about some of the groundbreaking research projects supported by the Prostate Cancer Foundation such as GVAX, a drug now in phase 3 clinical trials that boosts the immune system to fight off prostate cancer cells.

The fight against prostate cancer has come a long way. But this year alone, 218,000 more men will be diagnosed with the disease and 27,000 will die.

I could have easily been a statistic.

But thanks to the Prostate Cancer Foundation and the scientists and research they support, I'm alive to tell you about it. I'm feeling good. And I've changed my lifestyle . . .

I'm exercising and getting outdoors more often.
